#### **Christian Aid Week 2016**

A door to door collection will take place in the East Mainland for Christian Aid Week which this year starts on 15<sup>th</sup> May.

Although Christian Aid provides support where it is so desperately needed throughout the world special mention is given to the people affected by devastating floods in places such as low lying islands on the Brahmaputra River in Bangladesh. Homes and animals have been washed away and support is given by Home Safety Packages which allow for homes to be rebuilt in safe areas and help given by the provision of animals and seeds for crops.

In her last letter before she retires as head of Christian Aid in Scotland, Kathy Galloway said the following –

Last year you helped to raise an incredible £11m across the UK and Ireland – more than half of this amount was from house to house collections. We know that together we can achieve great things in response to Jesus' call to love our neighbours.

#### Getting Married in East Mainland Church.

It's Spring – and thoughts turn to love – weddings are in the air. The first weddings of this year are being booked. If you are getting married, or a son or daughter has announced the happy news – congratulations – the congregation wish the couple every happiness for their future.

If you would like to have the wedding in East Mainland Church please call me. The sanctuary has a warm welcoming feel with traditional pine pews and a lovely space for the ceremony which with an intimate atmosphere will suit the smallest of weddings just as well as the larger gatherings. Please ask for a wedding leaflet.

The couple will be invited to meet for a chat and we will talk about ways to make the ceremony personal to you. It will be a Christian ceremony and the bride and groom will be committed to each other so that they can make their promises to spend the rest of their lives together. If you have special circumstances please ask me and I will be happy to advise. It is becoming popular for couples with young families to have a blessing for their children during the ceremony.

You do not need to be a church member to be married in the Kirk. Everyone who lives in East Mainland can ask to be married here, and those too, who have a connection with the old parishes of Deerness, St Andrews and Holm — so even if you live elsewhere in Orkney or further afield if a parent or grandparent is a church member the minister will be very happy to meet with you and discuss your wedding day.

# Getting married in the Italian Chapel and St Magnus Cathedral

It is the Minister's duty and the right of East Mainland residents to ask the Parish Minister to conduct their marriage ceremony. Some couples choose to marry in the Cathedral or the Italian Chapel neither of which have a connection with East Mainland Church. If the couple live in East Mainland, are

members of East Mainland Church or have parents or grandparents who are members, the minister will be happy to speak with them about their wedding day.

It is usual for the minister in the parish where you live to conduct your marriage ceremony and maintain a link with you and if in doubt I will be happy to advise you who to contact.

#### **Messy Church**

What Messy Church is... is an all-age church experience for all the family. In an informal setting, all ages can explore faith, and worship God, through crafts, food and celebration! At Messy Church we make things together, eat together and celebrate God's love together!

Messy Church is NOT just a craft club!

Messy Church is NOT just for children!

Messy Church IS FOR EVERYONE!

What we need is Volunteers: At East Mainland Kirk we run Messy Church in 3 or 4 rooms which requires 3 or 4 volunteers holding PVG certificates to be present. The Law of the Land requires that volunteers working with children should hold a PVG certificate.

A <u>Protection</u> of <u>Vulnerable Groups Certificate is simple to apply for, it costs you nothing and only requires a background check to be run. Volunteers are invited to training days occasionally – the process is simple and straight forward.</u>

To volunteer please call the minister.

The Church of Scotland's priority is mission and finding new expressions of church, which is why Messy Church is so important to the work of the Gospel and forging links within the wider commu-

nity. Traditionally Messy Church happens in one big room or hall and everyone is together so that mums or guardians bringing more than one bairn can see them all, all the time. In that situation we only require to have one adult present who holds a PVG Certificate, however in our situation we require more PVG'd volunteers or take Messy Church to the Community Halls.

#### The Data Protection Law 1998

- the Law of the Land - is now forcing changes in the way we in Church have to keep our records. Although names, addresses & telephone numbers appear in the phonebook, and email addresses are published in connection with other groups in the community, if your name appears on a Church list that implies a religious affiliation. According to the Law of the Land religious affiliation is sensitive data and therefore to comply with Data Protection Law, the Church must have your signed permission to hold your details. Please help us comply with this ruling and keep your name on our roll by signing the form when you get it. The Church's Data Protection Policy is now on the website, in the Church foyer and on the Session Room Noticeboard.

#### **Privacy Policy**

This Privacy Policy covers the way in which the congregation of East Mainland Church, Orkney will use and disclose personal information that members, employees, volunteers, donors and other associates may provide us with.

Personal information includes any information that identifies you personally, such as your name, address, email address or telephone number.

The congregation recognises the importance of your privacy and personal information and we have therefore outlined below how the congregation collects, uses, discloses, and protects this information. We are registered with the Information Commissioner through the umbrella registration of Orkney Presbytery and strive to comply fully with data protection law.

#### **How We Collect Information**

The congregation receives and stores personal information provided by members, employees, volunteers, donors and other associates. This information can be supplied to us:





in writing or via email, by telephone conversation or on our website (e.g. when an individual is becoming a member); or

by otherwise associating with the congregation or its organisations, (e.g. by enquiring about our work, activities, employment and volunteering opportunities); or

when donating money to the congregation or its organisations.

We may also receive information about you from third parties.

#### **How We Use Information**

We may use the information we collect:

- in connection with membership records, for pastoral care purposes or in relation to your participation in our activities:
- in order to fulfil individual employment contracts with our employees (e.g. personnel administration) or for agreements with volunteers;
- in order to communicate with you (e.g. by letter, email or telephone) for example to provide information relating to our work or new developments;
- in order to further our charitable aims, e.g. such as for fundraising activities;

for internal administration, such as for accounting purposes, or for analysing how we may better advance the Kingdom of God.

If CCTV is in place we have this for the prevention and detection of crime.

#### **Disclosure of Information**

The congregation may require to share personal information held for a number of reasons including to provide pastoral or other assistance, process donations or carry out any other contractual obligations. This data may be disclosed to:

- the relevant Presbytery;
- other bodies within the Church of Scotland:
- relevant agents and third parties;

employees and/or volunteers including the charity

trustees/ office bearers.

The congregation does not permit these parties to use such information for any other purpose than the foregoing.

The congregation may also need to disclose your information if required to do so by law.

#### Your Consent

By providing us with your personal data, including sensitive personal data such as on your health, you consent to the collection and use of any information you provide in accordance with the above purposes and this privacy statement.

#### Storage and Security of Personal Information

The congregation via its office bearers and employees will use all reasonable endeavours to ensure that personal information is held in a secure and confidential environment and when the information is no longer needed it will be destroyed or permanently rendered anonymous.

You may request details of personal information which we hold about you under the Data Protection Act 1998. A small fee of £10 may be payable. If you would like a copy of the information held on you, please contact the Parish Minister.

If you believe that any information we are holding on you is incorrect or incomplete, please write to or email as soon as possible to the address below\*. Any information found to be incorrect will be corrected as quickly as possible.
