Have you heard it said that the Church of Scotland is the only club where non-members get the same benefits as members... I guess that's true enough because as the 'national church' there isn't a square foot of Scotland that can't call on the services of a parish minister if need be. And that's where the confusion can come because some folk imagine the Church of Scotland is government funded – alas no. Parish churches are funded, maintained and cared for by their congregations and just like every other charity it is the generosity of our members and visitors which keep the buildings open and the services of a minister available to everyone, members or not, living within the parish bounds.

You'll hear ministers say, and it is true, that being involved in parish ministry is an immense privilege. A Parish Minister is taken into the heart of a congregation and community when we share in the saddest moments and the most exciting times in folks lives and in the ordinary everyday stuff too.

And from my point of view, sadly, now as the number of ministers decrease and the administrative workload for each minister increases then each minister spends more time on paperwork than in their pastoral ministry and mission. The flip side of this means that the way is opened for the wider participation of all church folk in mission and worship leadership.

The Church of Scotland's Vision Statement says

The vision of The Church of Scotland is to be a church which seeks to inspire the people of Scotland and beyond with the Good News of Jesus Christ through enthusiastic worshipping, witnessing, nurturing and serving communities.

Fortunately, across Orkney, there are folk in each congregation with a calling and talent for reading the lesson, and writing prayers, witnessing their faith and sharing their faith with members and non-members alike.

I remember reading Luke 12:8 in The Message for the first time and being struck by the simplicity of language where Jesus says (I paraphrase further) something like - stand up for me and I'll stand up for you.

We stand up for Jesus when we tell his story and live our lives loving as Jesus loved by reaching out as he did, witnessing our faith and meeting folk where they are and are comfortable, and welcoming folk to our church and into our Christian family when they pass by which means opening our hearts to members and non-members alike as we serve and nurture the communities where we live.


Sunday School

Guild News



The Guild meeting on 1st March, the AGM, was convened by Joyce Johnston, who welcomed everyone and the opening hymn was sung. Wilma Johnston then led the discussion as to how the Guild will operate this year and it was decided to have four volunteers taking turns at leading the meetings. Some Guilds adopt this system now and we will review it shortly. After discussion Wilma agreed to be the contact person.

Final arrangements were made for the World day of Prayer service on the 3rd March and dates of future events were given out.

Margaret, Mabel, Morag and Jean then read a dramatised version of Matthew 20: 1-16

followed by a short account of life in the Philippines by Joyce, both items featuring in the World Day of Prayer service.

As Joyce was standing down as Convener, Maureen on behalf of the Guild, thanked her for all her hard work during the year.

The closing hymn 685 "For everyone born a place at the table" was followed by Joyce closing the meeting in prayer.



The Guild meeting on 5th April began with Hymn 336 “Christ is our Light” and was led by Maureen Tait. The accompanying music was from Isobel, followed by the bible reading at 1John 4 v 7-12. Prayer followed, read by Morag and a Helen Steiner Rice poem “Love one another” was read by Linda.

The project update revealed that some folk in Bolivia had received their solar ovens and were delighted with them. Also the Heart for Art project supporting those with dementia now have their 8th location for meetings.

The guest speakers Rosie Wallace and Helen Cunningham were introduced for their talk on how Church of Scotland ministers are selected. They are part of the National Assessors team who assess candidates for ordained ministry and for readership.

The process starts with candidates attending a Vocations Conference followed by a placement with a Minister and parish in order to gain experience. After that an Assessment Conference consists of extended interviews, practical activities, written work, discussion and a psychological interview. It may be 15 months full time placement before the new minister can be called to their own parish. The process is very detailed and requires a lot of work on the part of the assessors. Both Rosie and Helen agreed that it is a privilege to be involved.

After some questions, Isobel gave the vote of thanks. The meeting closed with “Thine be the Glory” and prayer.

BB Report

As I write this report, we have had our last night for this session, when we ended with a nature walk out to the back of the Ness to see if we could find oystercatchers' or sanderlings' nests with eggs. This year we found only scrapings of new nests.

The boys have competed in all the Robertson Trophy events this year as well as taking part in the Battalion Parade which was in Finstown this year. In all the years I have paraded with the boys, this year was the worst weather. It blew a gale and the rain pelted down, hitting us all in the face as we marched to the Church. I thanked the boys for such a good turnout on such a horrible day.

We had a visit from Mr Alan Taylor, who works for Scottish Water, to give us an idea of some of his experiences working with our water. He showed the boys how the water we drink and use in the home, comes from Kirbister Loch, how it is filtered and cleaned before we use it. We ended that night with a little exercise on comparing how much water we use, to the water used by children in Africa who have to walk miles to get water that we would consider unfit to use.

We will have our Awards Ceremony in the East Mainland Church on Sunday 14th May and on 25th May we will be trying to retain the Groundwater Shield for outdoor 7-a-side football, which we won last year. This event will end session 2016-2017.


