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## Manse Letter July 2023

I had an amazing trip down to Edinburgh recently. Although I didn't go for the Beyoncé concert, the clubs and pubs were buzzing that weekend! I was there for the more sedate General Assembly, where I had the opportunity to reconnect with many old friends and colleagues. It was good to see how we have all grown a little wiser (that means more grey hairs!) and more seasoned (i.e., more rounded) over the years.

As I sat and listened to the engaging debates during the General Assembly, it reminded me of the significance of our presence in the world today. With fewer ministers to go around, it becomes crucial for each one of us to share the good news in a neighbourly way. Acts of kindness have the power to touch hearts and make a significant impact, especially considering the challenges we have faced due to the isolation caused by the pandemic. During a recent sermon, I shared a quote from the renowned theologian Karl Barth that deeply resonated with me. He summed up his faith with the words of an old children's hymn: "Jesus loves me, this I know, for the Bible tells me so." This simple yet profound affirmation reminds us of the power and certainty of God's love, which we can always rely on.

In New York City, there is a minister named Bill Wilson who tirelessly serves his inner-city church in a violent neighbourhood. Despite facing immense challenges, Bill's dedication to his community is unwavering. A Puerto Rican woman, with limited English but a deep love for children, approached Bill and expressed her desire to contribute to the church's ministry. Although she felt uncertain about her talents, Bill recognized her love for children and assigned her to one of the church's buses that transported children to church from different neighbourhoods. Every week, she faithfully carried out her duties. On each journey, she would seek out the child who seemed to be struggling the most, cradling them in her arms and whispering the only English words she knew, "I love you. Jesus loves you."

Months passed, and the woman grew particularly fond of one little boy who never spoke.

Despite his silence, he faithfully came to Sunday school with his sister, sitting on the woman's lap. She would continue to affirm his worth and share the message of love all the way to Sunday School and back, week after week. Then, to her amazement, the little boy turned around one day and stammered, "I—I love you too!" He wrapped his arms around her, giving her a heartfelt hug. However, tragically, that very afternoon, the little boy was found lifeless. His own mother had taken his life and discarded his body callously in the communal bin. "I love you and Jesus loves you." These were some of the last words this precious child heard in his short life, spoken by a Puerto Rican woman who could barely communicate in English. This remarkable woman devoted her one talent to God, and through her simple act of love, a little boy who never experienced love at home was touched by the love of Christ.

While we may feel geographically distant from the streets of inner-city New York, we can still make a difference in our own community by sharing the boundless love of God. The most powerful way to accomplish this is by being good neighbours, as the well-known song asks, "When I needed a neighbour, were you there? Were you there?" I am confident that as a parish, we can resoundingly answer, "Yes, we are here!"

May we continue to spread love, kindness, and the message of God's unwavering love to all we encounter. Together, let's be a beacon of hope and a source of comfort in our community.

Morag then introduced Isobel who gave a most interesting talk on the history of the Deerness kirks, highlighting her memories of church life from childhood to present day. Rev. Harald Mooney was the minister there for 55 years for the whole of his ministry. Isobel recalled the fashions when she was a child, men in suits, white shirts and tie, women in skirts or dresses and always wearing a hat. Flower Services, Communion and Harvest Thanksgiving celebrated on a week day, the kirk would be packed on all occasions. She also shared tales of Soirées, which were held each year after the AGM. Supper was served in a paper poke. The contents were quickly eaten then the poke was blown up, burst, scrunched up then thrown in the direction of the visiting ministers!! This always brought laughter. Ruth provided a vote of thanks to all who had contributed to the fun and fellowship of the afternoon.

At their meeting in May, Guild members welcomed guest speaker, Rev Julia Meason, who gave a most interesting account of a trip to Japan she and her husband, Kenny, made earlier this year. Through photos we travelled to an Immersive Art Gallery, wandering through rooms full of mirrors and LED lights, huge balls and flowers, which created impressive effects for all to enjoy.

Throughout their trip they tried to immerse themselves fully in the culture, trying lots of Japanese foods – challenging for an Orcadian farmer at times!! While chopsticks were commonly used, Julia was grateful she had learned some Japanese phrases – in particular "Can we have forks please!!"

She recounted visiting the Samurai Museum and attending a Kimono-wearing tea ceremony, informed us of the religions in Japan and showed many photos of the huge buildings, the dumpy cars and of their trip to the Hamarikyu Gardens where, although it was too late in the year for Cherry Blossoms, they were treated to seeing many, many other beautiful flowers and LOTs of butterflies.

They saw Mount Fuji, and stayed in a Japanese Inn, where they bathed in hot springs and experienced a 'million course' dinner with lots of small dishes, including raw tuna and raw squid. In Hiroshima they visited the Hiroshima Peace Memorial Park, where they saw the monument to the children who died after their effort to clear rubble after the nuclear explosion and they saw the Peace Bell, where you can pray for peace as you ring the bell. Julia found everyone very polite, and was tickled by the obsession for Kit Kats with over 300, some almost unimaginable, flavours. She is certainly looking for an excuse to make a 2<sup>nd</sup> trip in the near future.
